The Tensions Between Structure and Fluidity: Attending to the Rhythm and Tonality of Human Interaction

This lecture offers an elaboration of clinical attention using musical metaphors to highlight the continual interplay between explicit articulations and levels of embodied experience not yet given formal expression, but already carrying emotional significance.

These levels of embodied experience can be felt and at times described in terms of rhythm and tonal patterning.

I will use at least one, if not several, clinical illustrations to emphasize the perspective I am offering.

This workshop will consist of a series of exercises to help participants develop their attention to their own embodied rhythms and tonal patterning as well as the rhythms and tonal patterning of others with whom they interact.

I will use these exercises as the experiential basis for recognizing dimensions of structure and fluidity in interactional dynamics and how these levels of experience can co-constitute each other.

Furthermore I will emphasize the ways that affective experience is shaped and shifted on these different levels of experience often outside of intention and attention.

How we might begin to navigate these experiences to bring them into attention and intention will be addressed.
